THE ROGER FREEMAN AWARD

Occasionally the 8th Air Force Historical Society presents its highest award, the Roger Freeman Award, named in honor of a long-time member of the 8th AFHS. Roger Freeman, of Essex, England, wrote 62 books about the 8th Air Force, preserving the history for generations to come. In honor of his years of preserving the records of the 8th AF in photos, this year at the reunion the Roger Freeman award was presented to **466 BGA Veteran Ralph Lynn.** Lt. Ralph Lynn won the Distinguished Flying Cross and survived 32 missions as a B-24 co-pilot over Germany and France during WWII.

Because Ralph was unable to attend this year's reunion, there was a letter from Dave Nowack, President and Treasurer of the 8th AF Historical Society. It reads: "We present you with the Roger Freeman award for 2015. As you know, this award historically identifies someone who helps preserve the legacy and history of the men and women of the 8th Air Force. We could think of no one more deserving of this honor than you... preserving a lifetime of memories, one photo at a time. I am grateful to Darrel (Lowell) for arranging and making this presentation to you in person. Know that we are all there with you in spirit!" Congratulations, Ralph!

Old Business:

1 - Attlebridge Notes Newsletter

The Fall 2014 issue of Attlebridge Notes is still the most recent newsletter.

Jim Haseman has suffered a stroke, and has resigned his role as newsletter editor. Helen and Steve Jordon, new board members as of 2014, agreed to take over the newsletter on a trial basis, and all present agreed to support them by answering questions and providing content on time.

The goal is to publish "Attlebridge Notes" twice a year.

2 - Reprinted Attlebridge Arsenal Book:





Two B-24 bombing runs. Two crash landings. Fourteen months in a German prisoner-of-war camp. Two Purple Hearts.

For Joseph Reus, that was World War II in a nutshell.

"I only flew two missions and got shot down on both of them," said Reus, now 92 and living in Titusville, Florida.



The group was formed in 1975 and has held frequent reunions ever since, said Nancy Toombs, the society's vice president.


"Our goal is to preserve the legacy and the memory of the men who fought and died in the Eighth Air Force," said Toombs, of North Little Rock, Arkansas. She attended with her 91-year-old father, Bill Toombs, a flight engineer on B-24 bombers during World War II.

The "Mighty Eighth" was activated in Georgia less than two months after the attack on Pearl Harbor. It moved to England in 1943. At its peak, it could dispatch 2,000 bombers and 1,000 fighters over northern Europe.

Of the 350,000 airmen who served in the Eighth during World War II, 26,000 were killed and 20,000 were wounded or taken prisoner. The Eighth's personnel also earned 17 Medals of Honor, 220 Distinguished Service Crosses and 7,000 Purple Hearts. The unit produced 261 fighter aces.

"I just worship the ground these guys walk on," said Steve Haktanir, 62, a self-described World War II aviation buff from Houston who is attending the convention. Nancy Toombs said reunion attendance peaked in the early 1980s, a time when many World War II veterans were just reaching retirement age. "At one time, we'd have 3,000 people," she said. "It was a huge event."

Now, though, even the youngest living World War II veterans are around 90. Most have died. A lot of veterans used to attend reunions of their own squadrons or bomb groups, where they were more likely to run into their own buddies. But many of those associations have folded, and many of the remaining veterans who are still able now attend Eighth Air Force Historical Society reunions. (cont'd)

Some of the society's state chapters have disbanded, too, including Nebraska's. (An Iowa chapter is based in Montezuma.) But Omaha still was an appealing destination because of the Eighth's long postwar association with the Bellevue-based Strategic Air Command and, later, U.S. Strategic Command. Many Eighth Air Force air crews trained at bases in Nebraska or Sioux City, Iowa. During the convention, the veterans visited the StratCom command bunker at Offutt Air Force Base and on Friday toured some restored World War II aircraft at the Council Bluffs Airport. Today, they'll go to the Strategic Air Command & Aerospace Museum in Ashland, Nebraska.

Reus, a Baltimore native, enlisted March 17, 1942, and was selected to become a B-24 navigator in the Army Air Forces, as the U.S. Air Force was then known. After nearly 18 months of training, he joined the 703rd Bombardment Squadron of the 445th Bomb Group at the Sioux City Air Base. ...

(When his plane was shot down the second time, Reus was captured and imprisoned in Germany until Soviet soldiers liberated the camp.)

After retiring from the military in 1965, Reus remained active in volunteer organizations, particularly veterans' groups. He had told the stories of his wartime adventures frequently at conventions like this weekend's event. "I was telling all these anecdotes. People said, 'Put it on paper,' " Reus said.

Four years ago, he compiled them into a book with the help of a small publisher in his hometown. It's called "Kriegsgefangener," German for "War Prisoner." (For information, email him at jreus7@cfl.rr.com.)

Nancy Toombs is well aware that World War II airmen like her father and Joseph Reus won't be here to tell their own stories much longer. She and the society's leadership want to reach the children and grandchildren of the Greatest Generation.

"We have a second-generation initiative," she said. "We're constantly writing articles that say, 'Learn about your father's war.'"

The Second Air Division was one of three Air Divisions in the 8th Army Air Force during WWII. The First and Third Divisions flew the B-17 Flying Fortress, and the Second Air Division flew B-24 Liberators.

The Second Air Division Association (2ADA) was a veterans-only organization. The Heritage League was established in 1987 by its parent organization, the 2ADA, and its members are composed of descendants, relatives and friends of former Second Air Division personnel.

The Heritage League's purpose is to perpetuate the memory of the Second Air Division of the 8th Air Force, and honor the efforts and sacrifices of its members during World War II in behalf of freedom and peace.

Through the work of its members and other entities it supports, the League promotes educational, social, cultural and commemorative activities which compellingly present this rich history to succeeding generations.

With the dissolution of the 2ADA in 2012, the League takes up the ongoing challenge of educating following generations about the sacrifices of our forbears in WWII, and continues in the honor of commemorating the veterans and presenting their legacy. We do this through informative publications, presentations and a host of other social and educational programs. We actively support related efforts such as the 'living legacy' Second Air Division USAAF Memorial Library, in Norwich, England, The 8th AF Historical Society, and the Mighty Eighty Air Force Heritage Museum near Savannah, GA in the US.



THE COLD WAR

U.S. nuclear forces were commanded from the headquarters of the U.S. Air Force's Strategic Air Command at Offutt Air Force Base.

Thursday, traveling by bus from Omaha's Doubletree Hotel, the Cold War tourists from the 8th Air Force met Offutt's tight security measures to gain entry. They rode past the site of the future \$1 billion-plus U.S. Strategic Command headquarters and were greeted at the former SAC headquarters by Air Force personnel and civilian officials.

Inside, a briefing officer described StratCom's mission and organization, and the group toured a museum of SAC memorabilia and documents. With hostilities still under way around the world, the legendary "SAC Underground" is off-limits to visitors. The building also is the headquarters of the 55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, which is the eyes and ears of U.S. military forces around the world. On the way back to Omaha, the bus riders passed historic parts of Offutt, including "General's Row" housing, which is still in use, and the former Martin Bomber Plant where the B-29 "Enola Gay" was assembled before its war-ending mission to Japan. An EC-135A which served SAC's Looking Glass flights was parked just inside Offutt's main gate, a reminder of the roles SAC and the 55th Wing

William G. Horney, Jr died August 22, 2013. He was born September 12,1921, in Philadelphia, PA. He grew up in New Jersey and attended Rutgers U. He was the navigator on the Dougherty crew and flew 32 missions from June to November 1944 and received the Air Medal and Distinguished Flying Cross. When he returned from England he married Jane Trimnell in Somerville, N.J. He remained in the AAC and then the Air Force for a total of ten years with many assignments stateside, overseas at Clark Field in the Philippines and in Germany for the Berlin Airlift. After the service he went to work for Owens-Illinois Glass Co. in Toledo, Ohio, and finished his degree in business at the University of Toledo. He retired in 1979 as vice-president of personnel for the company. He and Jane retired first to Hilton Head, S.C., where he enjoyed golfing. In 1988 they moved to Pensacola, FL. to Azalea Trace retirement community for more golfing and enjoying the beach. The Doughtery Crew was known for years as having the best attendance at the 8th AF Reunions, with all 9 crew members who had stayed in touch after the war coming back together there with all of their wives. He was the 2nd to the last survivor of that flying "band of brothers". He was also one of the veterans to begin bringing the "next generation" to the reunions with him. His daughter and son-in-law are Martha and Bill Curtis (466th treasurer, video person and B-24 photographer). He is also survived by a son, Mike, wife, Jane, 2 grandchildren, and 3 great-grandchildren. His family was privileged to have the Patriot Guard escort his remains to Barrancas National Cemetery on the Pensacola Naval Air Station.

Everett Jones, Jr. died November 4, 2013, Dallas, Texas. Pilot crew #432

Fred E. Davis died December 16, 2013. He was born in Dekalb, MO on July 17,1925. He was a tail gunner with crew #739, first piloted by Robert W. Harrington and then R.C. Greenwood., flying 26 missions. He married Margie Ann Ketchem, who survives him along with a son and daughter and 3 grandchildren. He received degrees from Northwest Missouri State and Wayne State. He was the founding president of State Fair Community College and was the first director of Missouri Community Colleges. He and Margie lived in Sedalia and then Clinton, Missouri. He was president of the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce. Fred and his wife were regular attenders at 8th AF Reunions, along with his fellow crew member, Herb Leopold and his wife, Rhoda.

Dr. Herbert S. Leopold, San Diego, passed away surrounded by his family on October 31, 2014. He and his wife, Rhoda, were faithful attenders of the 8th AF Reunions and were planning to attend right before he died. Herb was the bombardier on the Robert Harrington/ R.C. Greenwood crew # 739 and also with the David I. Bridgers crew # 765.

Herb grew up in New York and when he came home after the war he said his father told him he ought to study to be a dentist. So that was what he did. He and Rhoda lived many years in California and were active in the 2nd Air Division of Southern California annual luncheons. They organized the last stand-alone reunion of the 466BGA in San Diego, CA in 2004.



Herbert K. Achterberg died May 9, 2015 in Spokane, WA. He grew up in SW Michigan and married his high school sweetheart, Alice Maier. At Attlebridge Field he performed a variety of administrative jobs, including draftsman duties. After the war he had a career in hydraulic engineering. He is survived by his wife of over 72 years. When he died, Herb was still wearing one of his most prized possessions...a wristwatch with the Mighty 8th Air Force emblem on the dial.

Malcolm O. (Mac) Dike was pilot for crew #504 completing 32 missions between March and July 1944. He lived in Garden Grove, CA, and never missed a reunion until he was no longer able to travel. The only details we have received are from his grandson, John Dike. He said that Mac died in December 2013, shortly before his 94th birthday. His grandson has joined the Air Force and had started pilot training, receiving his slot while his grandfather was still alive. John says: "So years of 'my grandson's going to be a pilot' was finally confirmed."

John J. Horan, a resident of Ingleside, IL, since 1982, passed away on June 8, 2015. He was 92 and was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Irene, in 2012. They were always there at the annual reunions and were sure to ask about any who were not able to attend and express their concern.

John was the pilot for crew #676, successfully completing 30 missions. Their time at Attlebridge was from December 23, 1944, until April 16, 1945. So they had the distinction of flying one of the old planes home, back to the states, as the base was being closed. Most crews took a ship home to New York harbor. But John and his crew went via Wales, Iceland, Labrador, and finally Connecticut (as John recounts in Attlebridge Arsenal.) John will always be remembered for his articles in the 466th Newsletter, giving a detailed and fascinating account of the events at the annual reunion. His literary abilities will be greatly missed by all.

REDDY KILOWATT: the Electrical Power Generation Systems of a B-24

The G.I. truck came to a grinding halt at the hardstand. A B-24 fourengine aircraft sat there waiting in the misty fog-laden English atmosphere,
loaded and pregnant with bombs waiting for the delivery crew to take this
lethal load to Germany. The flight crew spilled out of the vehicle carrying the
flight gear essential for them to carry out their assignment. They heard two
distinct but familiar and reassuring sounds: (1) the voices of the crew chief and his two
assistants, as well as (2) the "putt-putting" of the gasoline power-driven auxiliary
generator, or "APU". The men and the auxiliary-power unit were both necessary ingredients
for the success of the mission. The three-man maintenance crew had been at work all night,
fine-tuning and loading the airplane. The "putt-putt" was sending out reassuring sounds
which generated kilowatts to keep the batteries charged and serve as an auxiliary source of
energy for the main electrical system during flight.

The anatomy of an aircraft has similarities to that of the human body. The human body requires the flow of life-sustaining blood which is pumped from the heart to organs scattered throughout the body. Life is the result. The operation of an

aircraft is totally dependent upon the flow of energy throughout the ship for its life. There are three sources of that energy (electricity); the ship's batteries, generators and the auxiliary power unit. They are all connected to a common distribution system serving the entire ship. Without this flow of electricity, the aircraft would be hopelessly without life ... totally dead. The P-3 Auxiliary Power Unit delivers kilowatt units for charging the battery while on the ground and as an auxiliary source of energy for the main system while in flight. In addition, there is an additional generator mounted on the rear of each engine assembly which in turn are driven by the four engines.

Engines are numbered sequentially, #1 on the far left, #2 inboard left, #3 inboard right and #4 outboard right. To get Reddy Kilowatt working, the APU is started and energy begins to flow to the battery as well as to the starter on engine #3. These sources begin producing electrical energy. First, inboard engine #3 is engaged, freeing the attending ground crewmen from the proximity of the rotating propeller. Electrical power is generated. Then engine #4 is started, followed by engine #2, then engine #1.

Reddy Kilowatt is under the command of everyone on the crew. Each officer and enlisted man on the aircraft has Reddy at his fingertips. The pilots and flight engineer must have electricity to start the engines as well as to monitor all of the gauges relating to engine performance. The radio operator must have it in order to run his elaborate communication system, the bombardier for the operation of bomb aiming and release system, the gunners to operate their turrets, and the navigator to operate his sophisticated equipment. Reddy is at work all the time the aircraft is on its mission. Back on the ground, with the mission accomplished, the engines and the APU are shut down. Reddy is at rest until he is called upon to be ready for another assignment.



From the Attlebridge Notes Editors....

New to the 8th Air Force Historical Society and the 466 Bomb Group, Steve and I are giving it a go: that is, to assemble a newsletter for the friends and comrades of Steve's father, the late **Col. Harold "Ken" Jordon.** H.K. Jordon was a co-pilot in the 466th out of Attlebridge, England, making 30 bombing missions over Germany between October of 1944 and April of 1945 with the Welsh crew. Ken went on to retire as a full colonel from the USAF in August of 1975 and left Offutt AFB for Venice, Florida, passing away in June of 2001. He and Steve's mother, Jane Merrill Jordon, are buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

A few years ago, Steve's brother, David Jordon, a retired municipal judge in East Lansing, Michigan, had time and resources to investigate their dad's WWII history, and decided that in 2014 we would gather at Attlebridge somehow and find out as much as we could about what Ken did there. The connection to **Paul Hindle** has been absolutely invaluable, and we cannot repay Paul for his help in showing us what Ken's life must have been like. Steve and I, Steve's older brother David and younger brother Brian, from Denver, gathered in Norwich in June of 2014 and Paul gave us the supreme two-day tour.

We went to a "flak house," ate at a roadhouse where Ken probably ate, drove on the runway that he used, stood where he took off, rested on the revetment where the Black Cat rested, went into a bomb shelter, and met some incredible people who remember when the U.S. fliers occupied their little villages. **Peter Woodcock** was a big help for us, showing us his view Attlebridge through the clear blue eyes of a child who lived on the base back then. We fell in love with England. Our understanding of WWII and Great Britain's need for the United States' assistance was clarified and strengthened.

Because of this experience and our gratitude to those who have kept these memories alive after so many years, we became involved with the Mighty 8th and attended the meeting in Nashville in October 2014. Having heard that the 2015 meeting would be in Omaha, my hometown and the hometown of the Strategic Air Command, we felt even more obliged to get involved and help represent our Omaha, the Strategic Air Command and our fathers, who both gave their careers to SAC. My father, Eugene A. Jackson, was a civilian scientist for SAC from 1950 till his untimely passing in 1966. I was named after a WASP, Helen Jo Anderson Severson, who was my mother's best friend in college and who died while in a trainer in a crash in Texas in 1943.

Meeting so many wonderful people through the 8th A.F. and especially the 466th has been life-changing, and we hope we can help perpetuate the memories and honor of those who have gone before. Two highlights of the Omaha meeting were my flight in "Miss Mitchell" on the Friday fly-in at the great Council Bluffs airport, and FINALLY meeting someone who actually flew with Ken Jordon at Attlebridge. Happenstance put us together with Harold "Bull" Dietz, of Palestine, Texas, and we were able to get some good video of our interview with him -- a treasure for our family. Having trained in the U.S. with Ken and spending much of his Attlebridge time in the same Welsh crew, he remembers things about Ken that Ken had never told us about. Uh, oh! We are so grateful for our time with Harold Dietz and thankful that his daughter, Dee, could be with him and take such good care of him.
