Related notice from Editor Helen Jordon -

The photo on the left is one that I took inside the B25J "Miss Mitchell" last October during the 8th AFHS reunion here in Omaha. We flew out of the Council Bluffs Airport. The Great Plains Wing of the Commemorative Air Force hosted us, and Miss Mitchell was brought to us by the Minnesota Wing of the CAF.

Joining me on the flight was Peter Paul "Rupy" Ruplenas, a familiar face at the conventions. He was known for his "Two Cameras, Three Wars" slogan, having been a combat photographer for the Air Force in WW II, Korea and Vietnam.

Rupy joined the United States Army Air Corps before Pearl Harbor on June 24, 1941. He completed basic training in Dover, Delaware. After basic training, Peter followed a two-week course in the Photography School at Davis-Monthan Army Air Field. He also served in Miami, Florida, with the 9th Anti-Submarine Squadron. He was then stationed in Sudbury Suffolk, England, with the 486th (Heavy) Bomb Squadron. He was able to fly along on several bombing raids and capture some amazing photos. During his service, the Mighty 8th Air Force, along with British air forces, helped change the tide of the war and weaken Germany through round-the-clock bombings. Rupy flew on many bombing raids and made it back, by the grace of God.

Rupy, age 97, died at the Martinsburg, WV at the Veterans Hospice on Saturday, April 16, 2016. He was born October 5, 1918, in South Boston, Massachusetts, and also was known as "Southie." Getting to know people like Rupy gives me a purpose in working with the 466th BGA. Rest in peace, dear Rupy. And to Rupy's son, David, blessings!

The project that has been taken up most of my 466th BGA related time for the last 1 ½ years is uploading our information to the fantastic online database of the American Air Museum in Britain, devoted primarily to the 8th and 9th Air Force units, aircraft, personnel and places. At last count, between the archives and the Roger Freeman collection, there were approximately 900 photographs related to the 466th BG uploaded as well as detailed information on thousands of 466th BG veterans, hundreds of aircraft and much, much more. Who is that little girl in the picture?

We've got lots of great photos in the archives taken during the war of people, both 466th BG servicemen and British civilians, who are unidentified. Many others are out there in private collections as well. One of my goals as archivist/historian is to identify as many of these people as possible.

To that end I received a message last year on Facebook through our page mentioned above from a British gentleman named Danny McGarry. Danny was visiting the town of Hemsby in Norfolk last year and wandered into a store wearing his A-2 jacket and WW2 era officer's "50 mission crush" cap. The lady behind the counter took a look at him and remarked "You look like one of my boys." Danny (I assume who already knew this wasn't his mother!) looked at her a little puzzled. She smiled at him and said "Come back in here tomorrow and I will show you what I mean."

When Danny returned the next day he was shown a photo of a cute little girl dressed up and surrounded by U.S. servicemen, most wearing A-2 jackets, and the unmistakable tail of a B-24 in the background. The lady, whose name is Anne Reeve, said, "That's me!" She proceeded to tell Danny that the photo was taken at Attlebridge in 1944. The occasion was the 100th mission party. Anne and her 466th BG protectors were being entertained by a game of baseball.

I put Danny in touch with Paul Hindle, our stalwart local 466th BG champion in England. It took a few months, but Danny was able to take Anne back to Attlebridge. Paul got her on the field and she had her photograph taken on the same spot she sat in the sun taking in that baseball game so many years ago.

Paul is doing this kind of thing all the time for folks who have a connection to Attlebridge. He has graciously shown my wife and me around the last two years. We are lucky to have him (and his sidekick, Peter Woodcock!) in place "over there."

Incidentally the B-24 in the background is B-24J-1-FO #42-95592 "Black Cat" of the 784th BS. I think everyone probably knows her tragic fate, which was to be the final 8th AF B-24 shot down in combat during WW II.

WWII Pilot Still Flying After 72 Years

BUHL • On Jack Wendling's 90th birthday, he flew nine takeoffs and nine landings at Buhl Municipal Airport.

Then he did one more each, just for good measure.

Wendling, of Filer, was born February 10, 1925. He has been flying for 72 years ever since he joined the Air Force at age 17.

His philosophy on flying is this — "Anyone can fly, but not everyone can land. Landing requires numerous decisions and actions in a short amount of time. The solution is practice, to include off-ideal conditions."

Wendling is a fixture at the Buhl airport. He is there two to three times a week.

"Everybody knows Jack," said Bart Morrow, office manager and flight instructor at Buhl Municipal Airport.

He is also known as a man with a wealth of flying knowledge. He earned a bachelor's degree in aeronautical engineering and aircraft propulsion from the University of Michigan in 1949. Wendling recently gave a presentation to the airport advisory board about engine performance and aircraft design.

"He's been there, done that kind of thing," Morrow said. "He's got experience flying airplanes most people only read about in books. How do you replace that?"

Wendling had his 1946 Ercoupe out of its hangar Friday afternoon. The orange 20-knot windsock on the runway flapped softly on its pole. The clear blue skies and gentle breeze would make for a good day to fly.

He finds it hard to put into words why he loves flying. "It's kind of infectious," he finally said.

As a recreational pilot, Wendling likes to fly out to Hagerman and soar near the wind turbines.

During WWII, Wendling flew B-24s and other bombers over Europe. He was stationed in the Norfolk County of Britain. Wendling said he later joined a reconnaissance team because he wanted to fly the de Havilland Mosquito, the fastest propeller airplane during WWII.

He served in the Air Force from 1943 to 1952. He was also in the reserves during the Korean War.

Originally from southern Illinois, Wendling started coming to Idaho to hunt. He decided to move to southern Idaho after retiring as a civilian engineer in the Air Force.

He wore a black cap Friday with the words "Black Cat" on the front. A pin representing the 8th Air Force emblem in Europe was tacked to one side of the hat. A set of pilot's wings was pinned to the other.

Wendling said he flew the B-24 Black Cat on several occasions before it became the last bomber lost over Germany in WWII.

As Wendling climbed on the wing of his Ercoupe Friday, he groaned a bit as his knee stiffened up.

"This plane wasn't made for old guys," he joked. "I can get in here, but getting out is a problem."

For him, a day at the airport is not only about flying. It's also a chance to be around people with the same interest.

"You going flying today?" Morrow asked Wendling. "I'll give it a try," he replied.




The Facebook Group, **466th**, is a public group, and you request to join. Then you can post photos and comments on the timeline. Administrator of the group is Bill Curtis.

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Connections on the Wall of the Missing at Margraten



There are six men from the 466th BG whose names are on the Wall of the Missing at the Netherlands American Cemetery in Margraten. I was able to photograph all of them while on a river cruise vacation in Belgium and Holland when one of the stops on our tour was at that cemetery.

Thanks to Brian Mahoney, secretary of the Heritage League of the 2nd Air Division (USAAF), for providing the names of the six men very early in the morning U.S. time on the day of our afternoon visit (European time).

Thanks to Bill Curtis for posting the photos I had sent via email, on Facebook, and adding highlighting so it was easy to tell "our" men. Bill also researched the names and discovered that two of the men were on the same plane, and it was also the plane Lou Loevsky was on!

William Terry was the pilot of Crew #612 and the plane was "Terry and the Pirates." Roland Erdman was the Tail Gunner, and Lou Loevsky was the Navigator. They were shot down on their first combat mission on March 22, 1944. Five Crewmen were KIA and the other five became POWs.

Attlebridge Anecdotes

Unwelcome Mission Surprise!

Bombardier on the Dougherty Crew was Ray "Buzz" Edwards, who told this story about one combat mission:

As they were approaching the target, he grabbed his heavy metal flak helmet and strapped it on. Within a few minutes something started to drip down on his bomb site screen and run down his face.

"My first reaction was, "I've been hit!" he said, but he felt around and there were no wounds — just a more steady drip ... drip ... drip ... drip.

He finally realized it was coming from his flak helmet. He quickly pulled it off and discovered that his best buddy and navigator, Bill Horney, had relieved himself into his helmet and, at 30, 000 feet where the temperature was 50 below-zero, it had frozen solid! Bill Horney explained that on the B-24 there was a tube you could go into but at high altitude, once it had been used by any crew member, it froze up solid. He said he had to go and the nearest thing was the Buzz Edward's flak helmet.



When we sent out our Winter newsletter, it had been more than two years since the last one. Needless to say, in that time period, there had been many changes on our 466BGA address list.

Many of the newsletters were returned, most of them because of deaths. We discovered as we researched that some of our veterans had been gone for quite a few years. In most cases we were still delivering the newsletter to the spouse, who had also died. Some of these veterans we may have included previously in "Taps" if we had been notified. But we thought it was best to include all we found in obituaries in order to not neglect mentioning someone. So, that is why this list goes back into the early 2000s.

This list of 49 veterans represents 25 states. Included here are men who did every job on a B-24 bomber crew — from the pilot in the flight deck to the gunner in the tail. Every job on the base is also found in this list — the bomber ground crews, mechanics, metalworkers, administrators, intelligence officers, and even movie theatre "crew." Many received medals, some were wounded, some shot down or crash landed in their planes, and some became POWs. Several remained in the service after the war and had careers in the U.S. Air Force. It took all of these men doing their jobs at Station 120 near a little train station at Attlebridge, Norfolk, England, in order to defeat Nazi Germany. We salute them, we extend our sympathy to their families and the veterans who served with them, and we thank them for our freedom.

NO DATE FOUND:

William J. Creeggan, Sacramento, CA, unknown job Joseph J. Hamrock, Monessen, PA, Mechanic Elwood W. Nothstein, Macedon, NY, Crew #580, Tail gunner

Previous to 2009:

Col. Lawrence E. Bortness, Phoenix, 1984, Crew #715/443, Bombardier, John Woolnaugh Crew. No Feathered Injun, 30 missions. He retired as a full colonel, with 34 years starting as a buck private at Ft. Snelling, MN. His last assignment was Base Commander at Carswell AFB. He was also Wing Commander at Osan and Kunsan, Korea, and Limestone, ME. He was famously known as the one who shut down Papa Joe Alley in Seoul. There was a lot of racial turmoil there and he was recognized by General John D. Ryan for his dedication to an open Air Force. He flew many combat missions in Vietnam and Korea, though his job was operations officer for quite some time before getting command positions.

Lt. Col. Burton M. Bush, Fresno, CA, April 20, 2008, Crew #455, Pilot Bush remained in the service and had a career in the U.S.F Air Force.

Arthur P. Childs, Portland, ME, May 31, 2006, Crew #715/443, Gunner

This crew was piloted by John Woolnough, the founder of the 466 Bomb Group Association and then the 8th Air Historical Society. The crew flew 30 missions, 7 of them as lead plane. Childs received the DFC with 2 Oak Leaf Clusters for his service.



Robert R. Cointepoix, Oakes, ND, May 5, 2003, Crew #568, Top turret gunner

Thomas M. Dilworth, Novi, MI, May 18, 2008, Crew #680, Pilot

William W. Hurt, Jr., Roanoke, VA, Aug. 15, 2007, Crew #726, Co-pilot

This crew flew the first of their 33 missions on D-Day as a new replacement crew. However, they were given an experienced pilot, Frank Walcott. There were a total of 68 sorties that day, with 61 of 63 available crews assigned to at least one of them.

Col. Harold K. Jordon, Venice, FL, June 22, 2001, Crew #565/473, Co-pilot

Ken Jordon flew the John C. Welsh crew's 30 missions, including a forced landing in Belgium due to a disabled, windmilling engine. Returning to duty during the Korean War, he taught ROTC at the University of Michigan, completing a 30-year career in the U.S. Air Force while assigned to the Strategic Air Command. He retired at Offutt Air Force Base, where he had been stationed three times during a career that took him around the world, including vice command of a KC 135 tanker wing in Okinawa during the Vietnam War. A recipient of the Legion of Merit, Col. Jordon and his wife, Jane Merrill Jordon, rest in Arlington National Cemetery within sight of the Pentagon, where he was

assigned, and the U.S. Air Force Memorial.

Elbert T. Sablotny, Cleveland, OH, Sept. 24, 2000, Crews #629/465, Navigator

James E. Walter, Hot Springs Village, AR, Feb. 19, 2007, Crew #657, Left waist gunner This crew was shot down by flak on Feb. 6, 1945 with Byron Johnson as pilot. However, Walter was replaced by Raleigh Murray for this mission. Murray and three others were killed and five were POWs.

2009-2012:

William T. Anderson, Parkville, MD, June 29, 2011, Crew #685, Navigator

Verl W. Bell, Pocatello, ID, July 27, 2012, Crew #788, Ball turret gunner

Maj. Robert B. Boyd, Grand Junction, CO, March 18, 2009, Crew #650, Pilot Boyd remained in the service and had a 20-year career in the U.S. Air Force.



Richard Henry Bradley, Sr., Camden County, MO, Oct. 21, 2012, Crew #787/495, Gunner In 1943-1945 he served in the U. S. Army Air Corps during World War II in the 466th Bombardment Group, 2nd Air Division, 8th Air Force, stationed in Attlebridge, England. On the crew of a B24 bomber piloted by Irving Waterbury flying runs over Germany, he served as flight engineer, waist gunner, armorer, and was a Staff Sergeant at the time of his discharge after the war ended.

Richard's first bombing assignment was Magnaburg, Germany — the Krupwerks, where heavy artillery was manufactured for use by the Germans. Another target was Kiel's submarine pens. His very last assignment was Tronstein, Germany. He flew combat in both B24Js and B24Hs. On June 10, 1945, Richard left Europe for his return to the United States on a brand new B-24M which had never known combat. They flew first to Valley, Wales; then Meigs Field in Iceland to refuel; then to Goose Bay, Labrador, and on to Bradley Field, Connecticut.

Daniel Chadbourne, Hillsborough, CA, May 20, 2011, Crew #551, Flight engineer

John J. Doskocz, Port Richey, FL, March 19, 2010, Crew #570, Ground crew chief SSgt. Doskocz was the crew chief for "Slick Chick." He was awarded a Bronze Star on March 31, 1945, for the plane flying 100 missions without a turn back for mechanical or personnel reasons. It was flown 117missions total.

Lt. Col. Charles A. Felts, Winter Haven, FL, Oct. 11, 2011, Crew #784, Pilot

On Felts' 9th mission on Mar. 12, 1945, flying a very war-weary unnamed plane, the crew found themselves with only one engine and were forced to bail out over the Netherlands. The crew was able to get back to Attlebridge via Belgium and flew eight more missions. Felts led quite a varied life. He played minor league baseball before the war, retired from the U.S. Air Force, was a Postmaster, and loved to golf and fish. He and his crew are the subject of a book written by Jim MacMeekin titled "Destination Germany."

Attlebridge Arsenal includes excepts from the war time diary that Carlson kept. He recorded the story of one mission when the crew had to land in Belgium because they were out of gas and had mechanical problems. By the time they got back to Attlebridge two days later, they were about to be reported as Missing in Action. He mentions receiving two Oak Leaf Clusters to his Air Medal. On their last and 35th mission they witnessed 12 bombers behind them being shot down. This was March 25, 1945, only about six weeks short of VE Day.

Stanford Goldberg, Highland, IN, Oct. 19, 2013, Crew #774, Navigator

Milton H. Holly, Vestal, NY, Nov. 18, 2013, Crew #601, Radio operator

George Kadlec, Columbus, OH, Dec. 1, 2013, Crew #704, Waist gunner and Flight engineer Kadlec received a Purple Heart, the DFC and five Air Medals.

Thomas M. McNamara, Beaumont, TX, July 13, 2013, Crew #541, Bombardier McNamara's plane was shot down on Aug. 9, 1944, over Germany. The pilot managed to get the plane to the Netherlands before it crashed. Both the pilot and co-pilot (Earnest Keyes and Ormond Smith) were killed and the other eight were taken prisoner by German soldiers.

Carl D. Peterson, Warren, PA, Jan. 8, 2013, Crew #489, Tail gunner.

Mark W. Solt, Allentown, PA, Dec. 27, 2013, Crew #597, Radio operator

The Sub Depot received airplanes which were too battle-damaged for the regular ground crews to repair. See "Attlebridge Arsenal."

Houston S. Bell, Judsonia, AR, May 10, 2015, Crew #669/460, Tail gunner



Sidney C. Bouwer, Highland Park, IL, March 12, 2014, Crew #702, Navigator

Bouwer received the DFC and Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. Born July 26, 1921, in Grand Rapids, MI, he enlisted in the Army in 1942 and served as a navigator on a B-24 Liberator, part of the 466th Bomb Group based in England. Upon completion of his service, he earned an engineering degree from the University of Michigan. He went to work in the steel industry and, while working, earned an MBA degree from the University of Chicago. He is survived by his wife, five children and nine grandchildren.

William A. Campbell, Clinton, MA, April 8, 2016, Crew #432, Tail gunner.

Campbell and Crew #432 began their training with the 44th BG at Norwich (now the city's airport) before they transferred to the 466th. They often served as lead crew (with pilot Everett Jones) and on two missions as lead crew for the whole Second Air Division. Bill spoke of viewing all these planes from his tail gunner position and sometimes witnessing their terrible fate. He was severely wounded by flak when the plane took a direct hit in the bomb bay on Sept. 11, 1944. However, he returned from the hospital to the base and flew 29 missions. He was very active in many veterans organizations, was past president of the Massachusetts chapter of the 8th Air Force Historical Society and was vice-president of the 466th Bomb Group. He never missed a reunion, except the year when he had a broken leg. He went back to Attlebridge with a group that traveled there in 2012. He enjoyed himself immensely, especially because he met with so many of the local people around the old base.

Morgan K. Cox, Bandera, TX, Sept. 19, 2015, Crew #533, Pilot.

Cox and his crew of their plane "Splash" arrived in Attlebridge just in time to fly the softening up mission the day before D-Day and then one of the three missions flown by the 466th on D-Day. They completed a 32-mission tour with Cox receiving the DFC, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and a Purple Heart. Cox continued to fly with the 5th Ferry Group out of Love Field in Dallas, ferrying B-29s all across the U.S., Africa and Brazil to be later delivered for combat operations in Europe and the Pacific. Cox left the Air Corps with the rank of Captain and as a civilian had a cattle and horse ranch in Texas

Paul N. Etter, Marietta, OH, Feb. 9, 2014, no details

Edward H. Jones, Hanford, CA, Aug. 16, 2014, Crew #782/490, Co-pilot Jones was at Attlebridge at the end of hostilities, so he participated in "Trolley Missions," taking ground crewmen and other base personnel up and down the Rhine so that these men could see the destruction that had been done.

John R. Mack, Las Cruces, NM, Dec. 26, 2014, #786 BS, no details

Martin H. Kern, El Paso, TX, August 2014, Intelligence officer

Andrew J. (Jack) Talafuse, San Angelo, TX, Feb. 6, 2014, Mechanic



Glenn E. Taylor, Decatur, AL, Jan. 8, 2014, Crew #423, Gunner

James Van Ginkle, Atlantic, IA, Apr. 3, 2016, Crew #752, Pilot.

Crew #752 flew two missions with Paul Dickerman as pilot. He was flying as an observer on Sept. 16, 1944, on Francis Bell's plane (Crew # 754) when it had a mid-air collision with Archibald Williams' plane, (#736). Seventeen of the 21 men were killed, including Dickerman. Van Ginkel took over as pilot of the crew. Col. Woolnough's book, "Attlebridge Diaries," records the psychological stress on the base as a result of these losses. Van Ginkel and his crew went on to fly 35 missions.

Harry E. Wade, Jr., Baldwin, NY, May 6, 2015, Sheet metal worker


Jerre O. Williams, Sr., Rockford, TN, April 23, 2016, Crew #633, Ground crew ("Dirty Gertie")
Williams was multi-talented. Besides keeping a B-24 in perfect order with the two other ground crewmen, he was the Assistant Stage Manager and projectionist at the Opera House, and served the flight crews in the mess hall. He was at Attlebridge for the entire duration of the base operations. He said he felt like the bomber crews were the real heroes, and so didn't feel like he should come to reunions. When he finally did, he was told by the navigator of "Dirty Gertie" that he was wrong — the ground crews were the real heroes because without them working all night to repair the planes and make sure they were safe to fly, the bomber crews never could have flown their missions and arrived safely back to Attlebridge. After the war, he had a career with Eastern and Delta Airlines.

Attlebridge Memories

Elmo Maiden's Introduction to Station 120

Elmo Maiden was pilot of Crew #664 which arrived at Attlebridge on Oct. 5, 1944, and completed 35 combat missions. He recently told the story of his arrival in England.

"They sent us to Ireland for the assignment of our crews to airbases. For two weeks we waited and watched the bulletin boards and finally noticed that we'd been assigned to the 466th Bomb Group at Attlebridge, England. I knew nothing about the base at all. They sent a B-24 over to pick us up, and they loaded all our baggage in the bomb bay. Our B-4 bags must have each weighed 40 or 50 pounds, and they had them piled on top of the bomb bay doors. The pilot they had flying us back to Attlebridge, the first thing he did was land us real hard and all the doors broke open and and the bags scattered up and down the runway. That was my introduction to my combat group."


